

**COCo (the Centre for Community Organizations)** is a charitable organization whose mission is to support the health and well-being of community organizations in Quebec.

Founded in 1946, the **Institute for Cooperation in Adult Education (ICAE)** aims to promote and exercise the right of adults to education and lifelong learning, and to adopt and develop a democratic model of continuing education.



**ProLiteracy**, also known as ProLiteracy Worldwide, is an international nonprofit organization that supports literacy programs that help adults learn to read and write.

Founded in 1995, the **Quebec Community Groups Network (QCGN)** is a not-for-profit organization linking English-language groups across Quebec.



The **RQ-ACA** represents 64 national groups and organizations and reaches more than 4000 autonomous community action organizations fighting everywhere in Quebec for greater social justice.

## Message from the Board of Directors

Another year gone by ... where does the time go?

This past year Literacy Quebec was more active than ever. From renewing our funding agreement with the Secretariat for relations with English-speaking Quebecers, to receiving the mandate to manage an important project from the Office of Skills for Success, there has been growth of human resources, office space and representations.

An important change this past year was to ensure that our reporting is done in a timely and accurate manner. The decision was made and ratified at our 2021 AGM to move our year end to March 31, in line with that of the government. This enables us to more easily report our financial position on our increasing number of government funded projects. With this being the first year of having a March 31 year end, it will be our first time holding our AGM before summer. It also means that this activity report reflects 10 months of activity and not the usual 12.

Thanks to the leadership of our wonderful Executive Director Margo Legault, a great team has been built to accomplish new and old tasks. The continuation of the wonderful support of our members during pandemic times, in helping organizations adjust their programs to respect provincial health directives, and in keeping our members connected through monthly virtual meetings, it has revealed the pandemic has solidified our network. Our new projects are helping to enhance our name, mission and purpose within the province.

Keeping up to speed with the growth, new initiatives and staffing has kept the Board of Directors on our toes, making sure deadlines for applications were met, supporting the Executive Director in the hiring processes, and meeting monthly to ensure our ED and team has the support they need.



Our focus this year was very much on the Human Resources of Literacy Quebec. We outsourced to have processes in place for recruitment, evaluation of potential candidates, interviewing, etc. As a result of that process, we were able to create salary scales for the employees and contractors at Literacy Quebec that more clearly compensate them for their responsibilities at all levels. We also supported flexible work hours, including four-day work weeks, allowing the Literacy Quebec team to have a more balanced work-life schedule.

It is starting to sound redundant saying this each year; however, I must once again mention the fabulous team of board members that I have the absolute pleasure of working with. From Eric's skill with numbers, to Wendy's infinite knowledge of all things literacy, to Sia's grasp of the business world of Human Resources, to Michèle's wonderful secretarial skills (that keep everyone aware of the business at hand), it reinforces the need to have a board made up of people of varied backgrounds, all coming together to make a cohesive team that is there to ensure the well being of the organization.

On behalf of the board, I thank all of Literacy Quebec's team (both past and present) who have taken on the challenge (during challenging times) of moving us forward and making us the voice of English Literacy in Quebec.



Outside of the above 13 workshops, there were also 7 workshops focusing on legal issues with the Éducaloi project. Legal experts presented a variety of legal topics, including volunteers' rights, copyright law, and legal contracts. See the Éducaloi section on p. 11 for the full summary.



Family literacy was also a popular topic and a new friendship was forged with the Centre for Family Literacy in Edmonton. They facilitated two workshops for us, including a 2-day certification course, called **Family Literacy FUNdamentals**. We had **22 participants from 18 different organizations**, including 5 of our member organizations. The workshops were facilitated by Kristin Dmytriw.



## Community of practice

Literacy Quebec organized 11 Meetups via Zoom in order to break isolation and to offer its members a space to share, collaborate and support one another.

### **22 different people attended!**


A weekly update to our members provided them with vital information and resources. 40 were sent out throughout the year.

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Literacy Quebec attended 4 of their members' Annual General Meetings:

- South Shore Literacy Council
- Literacy in Action
- Laurentian Literacy Centre
- Quebec City Reading Council

Despite no in person site visits being conducted due to Covid restrictions, we were still able to support members as they adapted to remote work and online tutoring. We also offered members access to a small professional development fund to respond to their specific needs.





## The Éducaloi Community Mobilization Project

In partnership with Éducaloi, the Regional Development Network and Seniors Action Quebec, one of the general goals of the project is to enhance the knowledge of English-speaking Quebecers about legal topics. The first of this two year project enabled us to provide **7 legal workshops**, to distribute print materials and to develop our network's capacity to provide referrals to legal services.

### Research & Data Project

Literacy Quebec continues to aim to increase its capacity to collect and analyze data and information about its services and the network as a whole. A key need for Literacy Quebec is to understand the impact of the network, identify the needs of those accessing the services, see the reach of the services and demonstrate the requirements for literacy services and support across the province of Quebec.


This year, we continued our work on increasing the capacity for our organization and our members to better understand how research and data can positively impact literacy. The Research & Data project, created with our members and partners, Data for Good:

- Designed and launched the Annual Member survey;
- Designed and launched a project reflection and evaluation tool;
- Developed processes that will help LQ and the members to use the tools
- Implemented the use of a CRM to help compile and track organizational data and contacts.

Another key aspect of this project was to build relationships with partners to advance the use of research and data. Partners included Frontier College, Canadian Heritage, CHSSN, and Data for Good.

## Literacy & Clear Language 101

As we continued to promote our eLearning course Literacy & Clear Language 101, we had a total of **45 registrants** over our abbreviated fiscal year.


# Literacy Helpline

The Literacy Helpline saw a huge jump in callers in September 2021 as proof of Covid vaccination became mandatory in Quebec. We helped to print or access **75 vaccine passports** in the month of September alone. Once additional security measures were added, it became harder for us to help those who had not had access to a smartphone or computer during their initial vaccinations.

**Stats: 106 calls from 71 different callers.**








## “What’s Literacy Got To Do With It?” Literacy Quebec Podcast



The podcast released its 7th, 8th and 9th seasons in 2021-22! ## Strategic Thinking Sessions

There were three sessions regarding strategic thinking led by expert advisor on literacy Brigid Hayes. Nine of our members attended these sessions.

The objectives were:

- To engage members in a conversation about the larger role of Literacy Quebec in policy and networking initiatives;
- To empower members to participate in opportunities at the local level;
- To ensure the LQ structure supports these policy and networking efforts.

## Empowering the English-speaking Community of Quebec through enhanced Literacy and Essential Skills

This five-year project is being funded by the ESDC.

Aiming to empower and improve access to literacy services for the diverse English-speaking communities of Quebec, this project will provide grants to organizations to support English-speakers.

The first step of the project was hiring a project manager specifically for this project.

## Crisis Management Project

The goal of the project was to mitigate the impact of disruptions to Literacy Quebec and its member's operations during emergencies by engaging the process of contingency planning.


The final product included the planning guide, planning tool kit and reference document. A printed copy of the resource was distributed to each member organization. Electronic, editable versions are available on the Members' Portal.

After the initial research stage, Marie-Claude Gratton of Espace Idées organized and put everything together, creating these incredibly useful documents. She presented the project to our members and, through the project, was able to offer support and facilitation in the planning process for individual member organizations.

## 40th Anniversary Booklet

After many pandemic-related delays, LQ's 40th Anniversary booklet was finally printed in the fall of 2021. Approximately **100 copies** have been distributed to members, partners, elected officials and friends of LQ.



## Book & Resource Distributions



Through an ongoing partnership with First Book Canada and First Book Canada Marketplace, Literacy Quebec was able to coordinate the donation and distribution of 14 684 brand new English books to various community organizations across the province.

**In total, 14 684 books (value \$192,543) were distributed in giveaways.**

# Community Events

Literacy Quebec hosted 14 virtual Community Events throughout the year and participated in 3 local in person events.

Total number of people reached:

**480 participations**

Over the year, LQ participated in three in-person events:

- A local Book Giveaway in June (**300 people**)
- A visit to the last Senior's Garden of the season, hosted by Reclaim (**25 people**)
- International Literacy Day - promoted our services and resources (Helpline, elearning, booklets) to 40 community organizations (**60 people**)



## Webinars and virtual events: Drag Story Time with Uma Gahd

Over the summer, LQ held 5 virtual, adult story times read by everyone's favourite unofficial aunty, drag queen Uma Gahd. Held on both Zoom and Facebook live, we reached a total of **480 viewers**.



Drag Story Time - Winter Edition was prerecorded and released on Facebook over the December holidays. In each of the seven 30-minute episodes, Uma shared two winter-themed books from classics like "The Mitten" and "Red is Best" to new favourites like "Malaika's Winter Carnival," "Meet the Latkes" and "Baseball Bats for Christmas."

There were **7 episodes**, **14 stories**, and a total of **954 views**.

## Family Literacy Day with Raffi




# Communications & Campaigns: Social Media

This past year we pushed our social media in new and interesting ways. Facebook was our platform of choice to focus on, as it has the potential to reach the widest audience.

That being said, Instagram and LinkedIn were both updated frequently and all major posts were made to those platforms as well.



An at-a-glance metric for determining the impact of our social media presence is via "reach" on Facebook and Instagram. As pictured below, **Facebook saw moderate growth (22%)** from last year, and **Instagram had dramatically increased growth (70%)**.



Overall, our presence on social media appears to be a successful one, as we are growing in reach and followers year over year. This is likely due to consistent, meaningful and impactful content posting, as well as action on other initiatives outlined in the previous year's activity report.



Still, there is much that can be done to continue and capitalize on this growth, as well as expand the reach of all our social media platforms.

# Top Posts Highlights

The highest performing post of the year was announcing that the Literacy Helpline was available for assistance in printing the vaccine passport. The post reached a whopping 5168 people! And nobody even realized that the printer in the photo has no buttons! Still, this post was shared an amazing 47 times, which contributed immensely to its spread and impact. The Literacy Helpline received dozens of calls to assist in printing during that period.



## International Literacy Day

We launched a social media campaign in the week leading up to International Literacy Day. Each day we suggested a way to celebrate, like promoting the Literacy Helpline, taking Literacy & Clear Language 101, exploring your local library or learning about Little Libraries in your area. These led up to a special edition of "What's Literacy Got To Do With It?" featuring MNA Christopher Skeete, Hervé Hout-Marchand of UNESCO, and the teams from Yamaska Literacy Council and Literacy Quebec.


## Freda Hudson Volunteer Recognition Award

The 2021 Freda Hudson Volunteer Recognition Award was awarded posthumously to Judith Moseychuck Schurman for her more than 15 years of service to South Shore Literacy Council.

She was described as a “driving force in implementing early childhood programming and broadening [SSLC’s] mandate.” She also had a deep involvement with students, and was a source for frequent counsel and a “bulk supply of elbow grease.”

## Representation & Advocacy

LQ advocates for and represents community-based literacy organizations. It also strives to improve the quality of life of those struggling with low literacy skills through advocacy and awareness efforts. This year, LQ participated in the following:

- **11 representative and participatory events, including consultations, forums and focus groups.**
- 4 meetings with elected officials and government entities, including discussions with the Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada, the Honourable David Lametti, the Minister of Education Jean-François Roberge, and the Office of the Commissioner of Official Languages.
- 1 joint panel discussion with Yamaska Literacy Council and Literacy Quebec, called *Adapting Literacy Services: Considerations for Reaching Vulnerable Populations in Times of Crisis*, at the QUESCREN Vitality and Education Forum.

LQ reached a total of **338 people** through these efforts.

All of these efforts resulted in a better understanding of the challenges faced by our network, the impacts of the digital divide and the need for affordable and accessible internet coverage across the province.





## In Memoriam

This year we remember one of our past Literacy Leaders:

Ruth Thomas



Ruth Thomas, South Shore Literacy Council's former Director, passed away on March 7th, 2022.
